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Cash-Away Lumber

In reminiscing about our 70 years, the sixties had to be our biggest growth period percentage wise.. Remembering the Wick's Cash & Carry yards that I had seen and visited while at Michigan State, I decided it was time for me to try their new method of selling.

So in 1961 an old building on Vigo Street, behind our lumber yard, became available. It was the old Recola Bottling Works, an early Vincennes soft drink company owned by the Recker family. We bought the building and opened up Cash-Away Lumber Company - Southern Indiana's first Cash & Carry lumber yard. Tom Chesser was named the manager of the new Cash & Carry yard. Tom remained with our company for over 38 years until he retired in 1997.

In those days a conventional lumber yard used a typical selling margin of about 30%. A cash & carry yard used an average of 15% margin, therefore our prices were

considerably lower than our competitors. This was possible because two of the greatest expenses of a lumber yard were delivery and carrying the charge accounts. When I was in high school I would make 10 to 15 deliveries a day with the pickup truck. I remember delivering a quart of paint every summer to an elderly lady so she could paint her porch. By eliminating the free delivery expense and by getting cash, our new Cash-Away could be profitable on these lower margins.

One of our good contractors, Jack Sievers, came in the yard one day and told us the other lumber dealers were saying "That young Niehaus kid is going to go broke". Needless to say, we didn't go broke.

The advertising in those days for a cash & carry yard was a single four page flyer with prices only - no pictures. Gil Kramer of Kramac Printing printed as many as 50 thousand of these flyers at a time. We circulated the flyers within a 40 mille radius of Vincennes and the customers came with their trucks and cash.

Cash-Away Lumber on Vigo Street was a huge success and by 1964 was out growing it's small office. So we decided to combine our two yards, Niehaus Lumber and Cash-Away and call it Niehaus Cash-Away.

A new building was constructed and state-of-theart machinery was installed to produce quality laminate counter tops. The huge miter saw is a lazer beam saw which produces precision cuts. Another key piece of machinery is the air table router that makes precision cut-outs for sinks and range tops. The Top Shop offers laminate tops in hundreds of colors, finishes, edge treatments and custom shapes.

Brian Smith is the manager of the Top Shop. He has been with our company for five years. Under his management of skilled workmen, the Top Shop is running at full capacity. They fill orders for Niehaus, the Big Buck stores in Robinson and Terre Haute, and WBM in Nashville, Tennessee, and St. Louis, Missouri.

• Use light bulbs that are proper wattage for your lamp or lighting fixture. A bulb of too high wattage or the wrong type may lead to overheating and cause a fire,.
